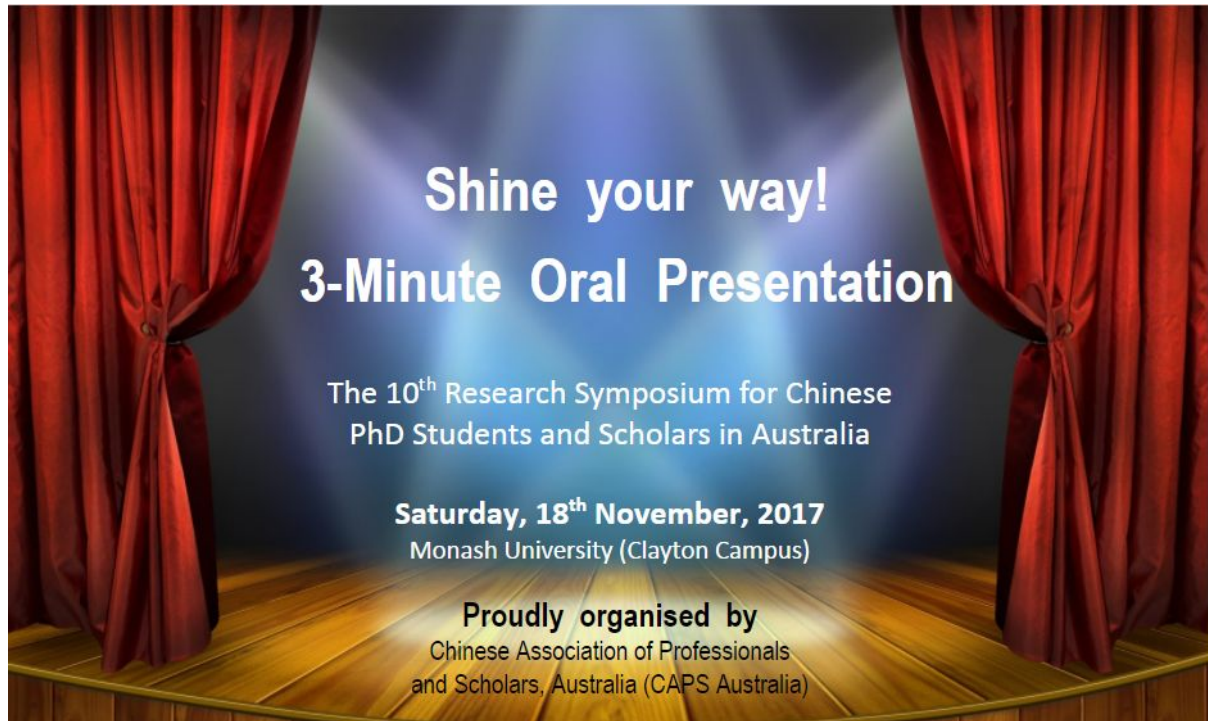

What is the 3-Minute Oral Presentation?

The 3-Minute Oral Presentation is a unique opportunity for all scholars and students to challenge and improve their communication capacity in presenting their research projects in a concise, engaging oration. It is about delivering your ideas, research, and its significance to an intelligent yet non-specialist audience.

The competition provides the participants with the opportunity to:

- **Share** the importance and potential impact of their research with colleagues in a broader community
- **Learn** about various cutting-edge research happening just around you
- **Improve** your presentation skills
- **Increase** your profile as a researcher and showcase your skills
- **Win** prizes and awards

How can I participate in the 3-Minute Oral Presentation?

- Upload a single static PowerPoint slide for the 3-Minute Oral Presentation Competition.
- Your submission will be screened by experienced reviewers in your nominated session.
- If your submission is recommended by the reviewers, you will be invited to participate in the 3-Minute Oral Presentation via an Email from your sessional chairs by 30th September

What are the judging criteria of 3-Minute Oral Presentation?

Presentations should include:

- A single static PowerPoint slide only (no slide transitions or animations permitted)
- Why your research is important
- What you have done to address the research question
- What long-term outcomes you are anticipating

Presentations must not include:

- Additional electronic media (e.g. sound and video files)
- Animations
- Additional props (e.g. costumes, instruments such as musical, laboratory etc.)

The judging panel will be looking for:

- *Communication style*: Was the presentation topic and its significance communicated in the language appropriate for an intelligent but non-specialist audience?
- *Comprehension*: Did the presentation help the audience understand the research?
- *Engagement*: Did the speech make the audience want to know more?
